1) JAMA Pediatrics article on CO2 levels in kids wearing masks

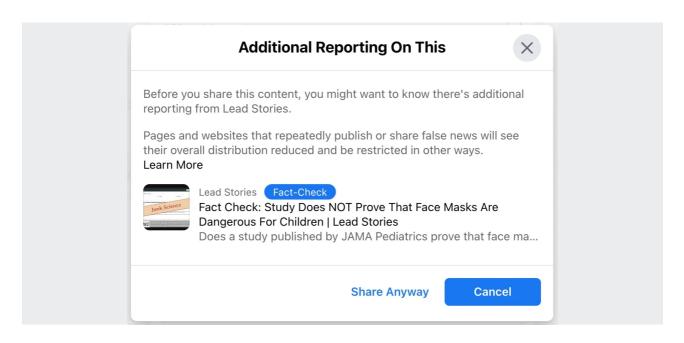
An <u>article</u> in the Journal of the American Medical Association Pediatrics explains a study on elevated CO2 levels behind children's masks.

#### 2) Penn scientists correct genetic blindness with single injection into the eye

From the article: "Researchers at the University of Pennsylvania have reversed a genetic form of blindness in a patient using just one course of antisense oligonucleotide therapy, Clinical OMICS reports.

The therapy, which takes aim at mutant RNA, was injected into the patient's eyes a year ago, in a trial treating Leber congenital amaurosis (LCA). LCA predominantly affects the retina, leaving people with severely impaired vision from birth, according to the NIH."
